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Dear Parent/Carer

In preparing for your child starting school, we would like to introduce the Southern Health NHS Foundation Trust (SHFT) public health school nurse service and outline the service that you and your child will be offered in school.

Starting school can be an exciting time, but it can bring on mixed feelings. School readiness is about teaching your child the skills that they will need, at their pace in order for them to cope independently and feel happy, safe and relaxed within the school environment.

During the first year of school your child will be offered the following as part of the Healthy Child Programme:

The School Entry Health Review

Once your child starts school you will be contacted by our service for you to give your consent for a health review. This health review consists of a vision screen, height and weight measurements.

The vision screen is specifically designed for children to help detect early vision problems; it is not a full examination. It involves your child naming and matching letters or pictures to check whether they can see from a set distance. If your child has difficulty seeing the letters or pictures, their eyes will need to be checked by an optician or orthoptist (eye specialist) for a further assessment. The school nurse team will inform you of the results and contact you should a possible concern be identified. The results of your child's vision screening will be held on your child's health record.

If you feel this is not required for your child please indicate this on the form, this may be because they are already seeing an optician, orthoptist at the eye hospital, wearing glasses or would not be able to complete this screen in school.

A separate letter will be sent to you with information regarding the height and weight measurements as this is carried out as part of the National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP). You are able to opt your child out of NCMP and details about this will be in the NCMP letter.

If you have concerns about your child's hearing such as, they frequently ask you to repeat yourself, respond inappropriately to questions, turn up the volume of the TV very high, please see <https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/hearing-loss/symptoms/> for more information on what to look out for and when to see your GP.

If your child has any health concerns or they are taking any regular medication, and this is required during a school day you are advised to inform the school of this at your earliest opportunity.

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Immunisations

Your child should have received their 2nd MMR and preschool booster before starting school. If these vaccines are still outstanding, please contact your GP to arrange an appointment at your earliest opportunity.

The SHFT School-age Immunisation service will offer the nasal flu vaccine in school as part of the childhood flu programme. You will be contacted nearer the time with details which will include completing an electronic consent form. Please can you ensure that your child's contact details are up to date with your GP.

How to contact your 0-19 Public Health School Nursing Service

If you wish to contact a SHFT School Nurse for advice you can do this using our text messaging service called ChatHealth 5-19. Parents and carers can text their query to a dedicated number, which a health professional will respond to within one working day. This text messaging service is an easy way for parents and carers to ask for help and information with a range of issues such as hearing, sleep, behaviour, transition to school. The support that we offer may include signposting you to other services, as necessary.

Text messages sent to the ChatHealth numbers will be charged at your normal call rate. The service is available from 9am – 4:30pm Monday -Thursday and 9am-4pm Friday (including school holidays and excluding bank holidays.)

Alternatively, you can contact our school nurse service via email or telephone; the team contact details are at the top of this letter.

PiP Parent Information Portal

SHFT are launching a new parent information portal where you can have access to view your child's immunisations. By the autumn term it is hoped that you will be able to view your child's National Child Measurement Programme (NCMP) results via the portal. If you wish to register for the portal please contact the School Nursing Team from September 2022.
